

Many cool things have been invented in Pennsylvania. And one of the greatest inventors of all time lived in Pennsylvania over 200 years ago.

Ben Franklin was a writer, politician, and scientist. He lived in Philadelphia most of his life and invented lots of things we use today. He was the first in America to organize a volunteer fire department, set up a public library and he even created the country's first zoo. He also invented bifocals, which are a type of eyeglasses, the lightning rod to stop buildings and ships from being struck by lightning and the odometer, which keeps track of how far you have gone when traveling.

Over the years, many new things came out of Pennsylvania. The first American Flag was sewn by Betsy Ross in Philadelphia and the first commercial radio broadcast was achieved by a radio station out of Pittsburgh.

Without any laws, the towns that we all live in would be a mess! That's why people in the House of Representatives and the Senate are always making new laws to help keep everyone safe and happy. I bet you can think of lots of laws that we need to follow in order to have a safe neighborhood. But that's only a part of the story. After laws are made, they need to be enforced. That's where the police come in. They make sure that everyone is following the laws that our government has passed.

Here is a list of some laws that affect us every day:

Public Nuisance Laws: Do not disturb the peace of others in public.

Litter Laws: People must place all trash in proper containers.

Traffic Laws: All drivers and pedestrians must obey the speed limits, traffic lights, and street signs.

Leash Law: Everyone must keep their pets on a leash when they're in public places.

Graffiti Laws: No one may deface or damage other people's property.

Assembly Laws: You cannot block public entrances while demonstrating.

Zoning Laws: Businesses serving "adults only" must not be placed near school buildings.

Shoplifting Laws: All customers must pay for any merchandise they take from a store.

PENNSYLVANIA FAST FLAG FACTS

If you visit the State Capitol, you will see the Pennsylvania state flag flying on top of the building. It also flies on top of our schools, courthouses, libraries and other buildings. State flags are important because they are symbols of what citizens and leaders feel are important characteristics of their state.

Below is Pennsylvania's state flag. All of the objects on the flag, even the colors, symbolize an important part of Pennsylvania and its people. See if you can match the object on the flag to what it represents below. Write the letter on the line next to the arrow. I did the first one for you!

MAKING LAWS IS












A few days ago, I took a tour of the **CAPITOL** Building in **HARRISBURG** and learned a ton of stuff about our state government! First, I flew over to the House of Representatives, which is on the right side of the Capitol Building. The tour guide told us that this was where our state representatives worked.

My friend, Blinky, asked the tour guide, "What does a representative do here in the **HOUSE** of Representatives?" The tour guide said that people all across Pennsylvania **ELECT** men and women to come here and make **LAWS** for all the state's **CITIZENS**.

"But representatives have to share the job of making laws with the **SENATE**. And the Senate is over on the other side of the Capitol Building," the tour guide explained. We learned that people who work in the Senate are called **SENATORS**. The Senate and the House of Representatives make up the General Assembly. Together, they make all the laws for Pennsylvania. The General Assembly is also called the **LEGISLATIVE** branch of our government.

Blinky and I were able to watch the representatives discuss **BILLS**, which are ideas for new laws. "If the representatives and the senators vote'yes' for the bill, then it's taken to the **GOVERNOR**. If the Governor says 'yes' to the bill then it becomes a new law! But if the Governor says 'no' to the bill, it doesn't become a law. When the Governor says 'no', it is called a

VETO," the tour guide said. Blinky and I hope that one day the senators and representatives would

senators and representatives would make a law that would let fireflies work in the General Assembly!


