PA MEDI (Pennsylvania Medicare Education and Decision Insight)

The Department of Aging offers this free and confidential service by providing specially trained certified counselors to assist with your Medicare needs. The objective is to provide unbiased assistance for those on Medicare, their families, and caregivers. In-Home Meals

Provides an opportunity for socialization at a local senior center while enjoying a low-cost, highly nutritious meal. Available Monday through Friday at most sites for individuals age 60 and over. Meals are funded through Older Americans Act funds and PA Lottery funds. Donations are encouraged.



PACE and PACENET (Pharmaceutical Assistance Contract for the Elderly)

Prescription drug benefits through PACE and PACENET are available for residents who are 65 or older. Income (from the previous year) limits are: PACE — \$14,500 or less for a single person and \$17,700 or less for a married couple; and PACENET — \$14,500 to \$33,500 for a single person and \$17,700 to \$41,500 for a married couple. Participants are to pay a modest co-payment for each prescription. Enrollment applications are available at Area Agency on Aging offices, pharmacies, legislative offices and senior centers, by calling 1-800-225-7223 or by visiting www.aging.pa.gov/aging-services/prescriptions.

Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program

Persons who meet the criteria (income, age, disability) may be eligible to receive a rebate on part of the money paid from property taxes or rent during a calendar year. Payments range up to \$1,000 depending on the claimant's income level (a maximum of \$46,520 for homeowners and \$46,520 for renters) or your total tax paid, whichever is less. This amount will be adjusted annually every July to reflect the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) published by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics, with all changes rounded to the nearest \$10. Applications for this program are accepted between Jan. 1 and June 30 (claims are for taxes or rent payments made the previous year). Mature Driver Improvement Program

Pennsylvania has a mandated discount on auto insurance for older drivers who complete a PennDOT-approved Basic and Refresher Mature Driver Improvement course at various locations throughout the Commonwealth and online. This program provides free transit services for seniors through local transit agencies. This program is funded by the Pennsylvania Lottery. Reduced fares for transportation services are provided to eligible older residents utilizing shared-ride transportation services. Reduced Motor Vehicle Registration

Any Pennsylvania resident who is retired and receiving Social Security or other pension and annuities that do not exceed \$29,906 annually is eligible to register a passenger vehicle or light truck for an \$11 handling feeinstead of the usual registration fee. To obtain the required form, contact a legislative office, a local notary, an Area Agency on Aging office or the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Riverfront Office Center, 1101 S. Front St., Harrisburg, PA 17104, call **1-800-932-4600** or visit **www.dmv.pa.gov.**

Identification Cards

Because many establishments require a driver's license for identification, an identification card similar in appearance to a driver's license can be obtained by non-drivers. Any Pennsylvania driver who voluntarily surrendered his or her license for medical reasons can obtain the special identification card free of charge. For more information, contact any PennDOT Driver License Center (bring along proof of identification, such as a birth certificate, valid or unexpired driver's license and a Social Security card).
